

The 2022-2023 school year was one of great growth. Our students took great strides towards recovering learning loss, improving school attendance, and building upon skills that will propel them to achieving goals. School districts collaborated to facilitate student opportunities beyond the classroom. Our office was pleased to offer numerous professional development workshops for educators and school professionals, uniquely designed to meet the needs of each of their students.

Last October (2022), after a year of planning, Regional Office of Education #11 hosted a Regional Institute Day that included participation from over 2,000 educators throughout our seven county region. It was a highlight of the year! Speakers Joe Sanfelippo (Mattoon High School) and Jimmy Casas (Charleston High School) kicked off our day with impactful, inspiring keynotes, and over 100 educators led breakout sessions across four sites. Calls for another, similar opportunity have led me to declare October 11, 2024 a Regional Institute Day.

One of the greatest challenges remains, for everyone, the hiring and retention of staff. While we continue to advocate for the removal of barriers to entering the teaching profession, we also strive to help school districts hire a variety of quality personnel. Paraprofessionals, substitute teachers, bus drivers, maintenance staff, cafeteria workers, and even administrators are all hard to fill positions in today's climate, but we remain a committed partner in finding solutions to combat our educator shortage.

Student safety is the highest priority of every parent and educator. This spring (2023), our office launched a School Safety & Security Initiative which we kicked off with a collaborative roundtable including our superintendents and all seven county sheriffs. Several national presenters have visited our region to prepare school district teams for worst case scenarios. Our office will continue to prioritize student safety and make every effort to ensure our school districts are fully equipped to protect kids.

As we look forward to the 2023-2024 school year, we hope to build upon the momentum from this past year. Additional initiatives will allow us to provide schools, families, and communities with resources to thrive. We will continue to equip and encourage teachers, train and educate school professionals, and ensure health and safety compliance throughout our region. Students first, always.






